Disabled Fund Drive

Culture of Life Program Director

Brothers:

As we start a new Columbian Year, we continue to be faced with challenges. Despite having a Pro-Life President, we still fight at the state level against pro-abortion politicians, and the media, to be heard and understood on Life issues. We have truth on our side but being heard and being understood are extremely difficult with the roar of the opposition drowning us out.

At the Grand Knight's meeting in June, I spoke about how important it is to be a good Messenger for the Pro-Life Message. If we are ever going to turn hearts and get our society back to a Culture of Life, we need to be able to communicate effectively with those that have been misled into believing that abortion isn't murder because the unborn aren't people; they are merely pieces of the mother's body that can be safely and ethically removed.

Every person who describes themselves as "Pro-Choice" and in favor of the abortion option does so for a reason. We need to discover that reason if we are ever going to be successful. Author Stephen Covey, in his book *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, tells us: "Seek first to understand, then to be understood." Find that reason, understand it, and convince that person that you do. This establishes rapport and allows you to hone in your argument to what will change their thinking.

We must acknowledge that the mother's choice is difficult (because it is); we must recognize that a woman who has been raped has been put through a horrible, unimaginable ordeal (because she has); and we must realize the desperate economic reality of the woman who can't see how she will ever be able to afford to care for and raise a child (because she can't). Only then, after seeking to understand her difficulty, pain, and frustration, can we speak to the life issue facing that woman and gently, lovingly convince her that Life is the only true choice.

As I also said to our council leaders, our programs speak for themselves in many ways. An



ultrasound image of her child, brought to the mother, conveys a powerful message. The 100,000+ diapers, 200,000+ wipes, and \$100,000+ donated, speak to our dedication to help that woman raise that child when she doesn't think she can. The 50+ pregnancy care centers we support show her that she will get the medical care that she needs, and the open arms of Good Council Homes, Several Sources Shelters, and Rafael's Life House, assure her that she will have a home.

But, unfortunately, this is not enough to turn the hearts of our society towards Life. We must be good messengers, because at the end of the day, Catholic Advocacy is what will accomplish our goal, and we must focus on that. Write letters to the editor, submit press releases on your donations, engage with people on social media, call your legislators and let them know how you feel and how you vote! Carry out your programs, then deliver your message with your strongest Catholic Voice! If you do that, we will be successful!
